The following are expectations for your participation in Upward Bound during the academic school year. Please note that the big Five UB guidelines from the summer program remain in effect throughout the academic year programming as well. By signing below, you indicate that you will make every attempt to meet these expectations. Failure to meet any of these expectations may result in probation or dismissal from the program. Until that time, we expect that you will:

- Attend school on a regular basis and remain in **GOOD** academic standing. All students must also be enrolled in at least 2 college preparation classes each quarter.
- Demonstrate a consistently good effort in all of your classes. Specifically, you agree that if you are not achieving at a proficient level or above in any class during a marking period you will complete UB weekly monitoring forms until you reach a level of proficiently or better as evidenced by your next progress report.
- Attend & participate in center meetings as scheduled at your school. Students who fail to attend at least 75% of scheduled center meetings for the academic year will not be guaranteed a slot in the 2020 summer program.
- If you cannot attend a meeting it is your responsibility to contact your ISC and set up a time to meet individually. Any student who fails to keep in regular contact with their ISC & center will be placed on program probation or may be asked to leave the program. In addition, any student who is employed after school should make arrangements to begin work after your center meeting.
- Attend all Saturday College Meetings and complete all related assignments.
- Complete Quarterly Goal Sheets and Personal Learning Plans
- Create and actively maintain a Dollars for Scholars scholarship profile at https://nvujupwardbound.dollarsforscholars.org
- Assist in planning, coordination, and participation of community service events.
- Regularly check your Upward Bound vttrio.org email account.
- Seek help from your ISC and the UB office staff as soon as the need arises.

Tufts University



Tufts University is a world-class research institution with an emphasis on the interdisciplinary, offering undergraduate degrees in liberal arts, engineering, and fine arts. As a mid-size university, Tufts offers the chance to join a close-knit community that supports students' desires to take intellectual risks and challenge conventional wisdom, all in a beautiful campus setting just five miles from downtown Boston, one of America's most exciting cities.

Open House, Fly-In, Visit Voices of Tufts Diversity Experiences

The Voices of Tufts Diversity Experiences are two overnight programs designed to expose high school seniors to the diversity within the Tufts community. The two-day programs take place each October; one program seeks students interested in our School of Engineering and the other seeks students interested in our School of Arts & Sciences.

Special Admissions Policy QuestBridge

Tufts partners with QuestBridge, a national non-profit organization dedicated to connecting high-achieving, low-income high school students to leading universities. Tufts also has an active chapter of the Quest Scholars Network, which provides support and facilitates community for QuestBridge students on campus.

Scholarship & Financial Aid Loan Replacement Policy/Financial Aid

Tufts' Loan Replacement Policy replaces loans with scholarship grants for undergraduates whose annual family incomes fall below \$60,000. Tufts meets 100% of demonstrated need for all admitted students, regardless of citizenship status.

Summer Bridge & Orientation Bridge to Liberal Arts Success at Tufts (BLAST) and Bridge to Engineering Success at Tufts (BEST)

BLAST and BEST are two six-week residential summer bridge programs for a select group of incoming liberal arts and engineering students. The programs are designed to give selected students an opportunity to take two Tufts courses for credit while participating in academic and college life workshops that help first-year students make the transition to college.

Summer Bridge & Orientation Building Engagement and Access for Students at Tufts (BEAST)

BEAST is a free, four-day Pre-Orientation program that focuses on the unique social and cultural experiences specific to students who may be the first in their families to attend college, and for students seeking guidance on navigating financial and academic resources at Tufts.

Student Life & Support FIRST Resource Center

The FIRST Resource Center was founded to create an inclusive community of support and to develop a network of resources for Tufts University's first-generation, low-income, and undocumented populations. The Center works to provide the necessary financial knowledge, information about Tufts, and access to opportunities and resources for students to be successful during their time at the University.

First-Year Experience & Transition Redefining the Image of Science and Engineering (RISE)

RISE is an academic advising course designed to support first-generation, academically talented students pursuing degrees in science and engineering. RISE scholars receive advising and mentorship, and academic credit for participation in weekly seminars that focus on navigating college life, exposure to faculty research, and professional networking.

Pre-College Prep & Outreach Junior Jump Off and Three For All

Junior Jump Off is an overnight program at UVM for identified high-achieving high school juniors outside of Vermont, while Three For All is designed for high-achieving high school juniors in Vermont to explore UVM, St. Michael's College and Champlain College. The programs both include an academic overview, campus tour, dining on campus, and a faculty-led academic program.

Summer Bridge & Orientation Summer Enrichment Scholars Program (SESP)

The Summer Enrichment Scholars Program (SESP) is created by the Mosaic Center for Students of Color (MCSC) at the University of Vermont. The MCSC's mission is to increase the retention of students of color on campus by providing holistic support of their academic achievement, personal growth, identity formation, and cultural development.

Open House, Fly-in, Visit Discovering UVM

Discovering UVM is geared toward high school seniors from underrepresented groups, where students are assisted with their college search by exploring academic and extracurricular offerings at UVM. Students spend two days in our residence halls with a UVM student host, attend a class, and learn about the college application process.

Open House, Fly-in, Visit Joining the Circle
