#### Awards Night 2011 brings out the champions

St. Louis Park High School's annual Academic Awards Night, held last May 25, marked a night of champions within the community. Nearly \$80,000 in Dollars for Scholars scholarship money was awarded to 108 graduating seniors. Each in his or her own right was a champion graduate, selected on merit for a variety of

scholarships funded by the strong support of the St. Louis Park community. Neighborhood scholarships made up the bulk of these community-based awards. Many were presented by student volunteers who distributed newsletters and solicited donations within SLP neighborhoods. Other scholarships were funded by diverse sources; a variety of individuals and associations that make our city a shining example of how working together builds a better community.

The scholarships awarded to graduating seniors represent the promise DFS donors recognize in the power of education to improve people and the future. DFS donors offer congratulations to seniors for a job well done. Each donation underscores the belief that with education and community support, the future belongs to our scholars.

#### DFS Scholarships needed more than ever

Dollars for Scholars is one part of the solution to the tuition woes that haunt post secondary students. As tuition increases well beyond the rate of inflation, students and parents share greater worries about paying for post secondary school. Lauren Segal, president and CEO of the national Dollars for Scholars organization, predicts that this year's student loan debt will hit one trillion dollars. Government and private loans put college within reach of many but scholarship money can ease the pain of repayment and give students a leg up on managing their finances.

The U.S. has dropped from first to twelfth in the percentage of adults with college degrees. Segal claims it would take 20 million workers with postsecondary degrees to regain our former top position by 2025. That's a bold undertaking; the kind of challenge SLP DFS wants to contribute to by awarding scholarship money to our community's promising new graduates.

#### Neighborhood scholarships on the rise

Each year, student volunteers canvas Park neighborhoods to distribute DFS newsletters and donation requests. They cover a lot of territory and it's paying off in increased scholarship donations. Last year, over 100 volunteers covered 18 neighborhoods. The result? Over \$18,800 was collected through volunteer efforts and neighborhood association newsletters for an increase of \$3,000 over 2010's neighborhood total.

Neighborhoods are strong supporters of DFS. Many residents take pride knowing they contribute to a scholarship for one of the community's own. Many want to give back because their child was recognized with a DFS scholarship. They have first-hand knowledge of the honor and usefulness such scholarships bring to new graduates.
